Cheaper, More Accessible Software - Open Source Software

FREE AND OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

The PC User Group's next free Monthly Meeting will be held at 7.30pm on Monday 30 August 2004 in Manning Clark Theatre 3 at the Australian National University. This month's speakers will be Rainer Klein and Dorothy Klein from R & D Soft Pty Ltd, talking about open source software such as Mozilla and Open Office.

Do you wish there is an alternative to proprietary products? Are you tired of paying for expensive updates every few years when you use only 10% of a software's features? Do you want more secure software? Open source software is that software whose source code has been made freely available to developers on the Internet under a copyright which allows its use subject to permitting or requiring the exchange of revised source code.

Rainer Klein will talk about alternative web browsers and email clients, such as Mozilla Thunderbird and Firefox, which improve communications and computer security. Rainer has had 35 years experience in computing, the last 20 years being in software development and, with his wife Dorothy, they currently run their own open source software development company.

Dorothy Klein will demonstrate Open Office, the inexpensive office suite incorporating a word processor, spreadsheet, data base, illustrator and publisher, presentation editor and all the tools needed in a modern office suite. Open Office is generally compatible with Microsoft Office products. Dorothy has spent 20 years in software, including 10 years teaching Microsoft products, and is currently helping run their software development company.

PCUG Broadband via TransACT Charges Reduced Yet Again

The PCUG Committee, in association with that the ISSC, has reviewed the charges for the PCUG Internet Services as part of its preparation of its budget for the coming financial year. The Committee has decided that we can now afford to reduce the charges we make for Broadband via TransACT as follows -

Pay in advance for twelve months or 7,200Mb - \$240 (down from \$280)

Pay in advance for six months or 3,600Mb - \$130 (down from \$145)

Pay in advance for three months or 1,800Mb - \$70 (down from \$75)

The new charges will take effect from 1 September 2004.



Report on Committee Meeting on 9 August 2004

The Committee confirmed that the next Members Information Session would be held in the PCUG Centre at 2pm on Saturday 11 September. The Executive would prepare the program.

Arrangements for the AGM to be held on 27 September were discussed in some detail. The Committee agreed that notices would be sent entirely by email this year, as is provided for in the Constitution, thus saving some thousands of dollars. There will be a presentation on a matter of interest to members at the conclusion of the AGM and before supper. Nominations for members to serve on the next year's Committee close with the Secretary at 5pm on Tuesday 21 September 2004.

The Committee reviewed the results of the survey of members. Over 400 members responded to the question-airre. The Committee thanked Paul Free for doing the huge amount of work involved in analysing the responses. The Committee will publish a formal response to the survey in the next few weeks. Broadly, members agreed that "Computer Users Helping Users" best reflects the objectives of the club.

Members showed little interest in the PCUG Centre, with few seeing the need for a meeting room or having visited the Centre except to pay their fees. Most members accepted that we need an office of some sort. There were no strong views as to location. Few members were interested in keeping the Training Room.

Members were generally happy with the PCUG Internet Service, and wished it to continue. They also wished the Advisory Service and the newsletter in its current form to continue. Members supported the continuation of SIGs, but few were interested in the continuation of the Monthly Meeting, with some criticism of past meetings.

The Internet Service Sub-Committee (ISSC) reported that the update of the PCUG web site was progressing well, and members would soon see the updated version. It was hoped that an automated payment system would be in operation in the new web site when it came into operation. The ISSC had spent some time developing policies for spam and virus checking, and would submit drafts to the TIP admins soon, before seeking Committee approval.

The ISSC reported that the difficulties with the new PCUG ADSL service had been resolved, with the help and hard work of the TIP admins, and the service was now operational. Seven members were now enjoying broadband service using the ADSL system at the time of the meeting.

The Treasurer submitted a draft budget for 2004-5 which suggests that PCUG will have an operating surplus of \$22,000, made up of a deficit of \$10,000 on club operations and a surplus of \$32,000 on internet operations. The Committee approved the draft budget.

The Treasurer's report on financial operations in July showed an overall surplus of \$8,000 - reasonably in line with the budget.

The Treasurer submitted a forcast of the financial outcome for PCUG over the next four years, making a range of assumptions. It suggested that continuing the lease on the current premises for another three years would strain the resources of the club.

The Committee decided to review its position on the lease of the current premises at its meeting in September.

The Centre Manager reported that the Training Room had been hired for a number of days in the last month and that the new audio-visual equipment in the Centre was getting much use.

The next Committee meeting on 13 September will be the last before the AGM.

PCUG Internet Service

PCUG has recently made more improvements to the PCUG Internet Service

Transparent proxying on our internet service has now implemented. This means that you no longer MUST specify a proxy server in your browser configuration. The proxy server will continue to be used for all standard world wide web traffic. Existing configurations will continue to work and there is no need to change them.

If a proxy server is configured, that will be used. If none is specified, the TIP system will automatically forward all standard web traffic to our proxy server.

The TIP servers are now protected by a firewall. The servers are set up so that any connections initiated from them are OK, but inbound connections are only allowed to certain standard ports.

Currently the following ports inbound to all our machines (including members) are blocked:

TCP: 69 sunrpc ldap ldaps 135-139 445

UDP: tftp sunrpc snmp snmp-trap 2049 ldap ldaps 135-139 445

And outbound TCP: 135-139 445

The 135-139 range and 445 are to prevent the spread of the recent MS viruses that seem to be still with us.

Please send any requests for ports to be "opened" and report any problems to <help@tip.net.au>.

Effective the beginning of February we have added six more modems for use by dial-up users, giving our dial-up users access to a total of ninety modems.

Problems Logging into the Internet Service?

If you ever find yourself failing to log in to TIP, STOP and don't waste any more money trying to dial in again. The two major reasons for failing to login are firstly, you have run out of TIP or PCUG membership, or secondly, your Username and or your Password have become corrupt. Paying more money fixes the first problem, re-typing your Username and Password into the Log In dialogue fixes the second problem 99% of the time. If neither of those fixes works for you then telephone the PCUG Centre and ask for help (unless you can access someone elses email, in which case send an email to <help@tip.net.au>.

The SIAF Board of Directors presented the award for Lifetime Achievement to Paris Karahalios of TRIUS, Inc. for his accomplishments and service to the industry since 1986. The SIAF People's Choice Awards were also presented during the banquet. These awards are voted on by the public at Internet download sites like CNET, Simtel, Tucows, and the Web sites of hundreds of software developers. Jean-Guy Ducreux, Chris Thornton, and CNET Networks were inducted into the Shareware Hall of Fame.

The Shareware Industry Awards Foundation is a non-profit corporation that was created in 1991 for the purpose of hosting the annual Shareware Industry Conference. The SIC is attended by software developers, e-commerce providers, vendors, and others involved in the shareware industry from around the world. The conference features educational sessions on a wide range of topics of interest to software developers including marketing, Web site design, press releases, and more. The conference is sponsored by a number of companies both large and small.

TEN RULES FOR BEATING NET NASTIES

PCUG has ten simple rules that you can use to protect your computer and yourself from the risks of malware, junk email and browser irritants that impede your objectives. Our ten best combat strategies and tactics are:

- 1. Recognise the risks to yourself and to your computer community and address those risks. Take suitable steps to avoid, reduce, or shift part of the risk to someone else (with their knowledge and agreement of course). Ensure that you know how to apply these rules, or have someone help you do it. Get training to help you understand and apply these practices. Know how to recognise scams. Be alert (but not alarmed).
- 2. Get your operating system up to date and keep it that way. Carefully choose the security setup and options in your operating system, Internet browser and email reader. Log onto your computer with a separate identity for your Internet banking. Do not automatically record passwords on entry forms, especially on laptops, which have a disproportionate risk of being stolen.
- 3. Always run a good anti-virus program such as Vet, Norton, Avast or AVG. Keep your anti-virus definitions right up to date by having your anti-virus program check for new definitions automatically at the very start of your first Internet session each day. Run Spybot or equal regularly to clean out spyware. Know how to clean out if you do get a virus, Trojan or worm.
- 4. Backup your data, your settings, your programs and your updates regularly and verify restoration. Maintain your computer by regularly running cleanups and defragmentation. Keep your machine clean and lean.
- 5. Use a firewall. Everyone (even dial-up users) should use software firewalls, such as ZoneAlarm, or hardware and software firewalls or gateways. Firewalls are imperative for controlling the ports of broadband and ADSL users, who could be connected 24 hours a day at a fixed Internet address and are therefore at greatest risk.
- 6. Preview your email. Use your ISP's webmail or other email preview method, such as Mailwasher, to look over your new email headers and to delete infected or suspicious files and overblown or unwanted messages and attachments before you download them to your own computer. This also reduces download time.
- 7. Never, ever open or double click on an email attachment or file if you are not 100% confident of where it came from. Best practice is to save files to your disk and run your anti-virus program on the saved file before you open it. Consider using your email reader's rules to send all emails with attachments to a quarantine folder for scanning.
- 8. Never, ever respond to junk email or browser pop-ups. It only encourages more. Never respond to stray opt out messages unless you are certain of the sender. If an email offer seems too good to be true, then it is probably not real.
- 9. Advanced and power users, and those at greatest risk, should run a second compatible anti-virus program and keep it up to date. For those at greatest risk (many sites browsed, lots of downloads) and with the greatest consequence of loss (e.g. business, crucial NGO work), run a second compatible anti-virus program from a different software maker overnight.
- 10. Use the PC Users' Group to stay abreast of our best combat practices as we improve them. Get access to experienced helpers, monthly PCUG newsletter, our training programme, and useful Special Interest Groups. If the worst happens to you, you can use the computers in the PCUG Centre, which is open seven days a week from 10am to 2pm on weekdays, 9am to 5pm Saturdays and 9am to 4pm Sundays (excepting public holiday weekends).

Mydoom variant begins to spread

A new variant of the Mydoom worm has begun spreading in Australia, the anti-virus firm NOD32 says.

Company spokesman Rod Fewster said Mydoom.T had been detected in Japan late on Sunday afternoon. "By the time Japan opened for business yesterday the worm was spreading like wildfire. We're seeing a similar spread pattern here today," he said.

Fewster said the email-borne worm had the word "photos" in its subject line and the body text read "LOL!)))). The name of the sender was spoofed and an attachment called photos_arc.exe was in the email.

Once the worm infects a PC, it harvests the machine for email addresses and sends itself to each one. It then installs a backdoor on the PC to allow the creator to gain remote access and use the PC for sending spam.

Fewster said the worm would block access to the websites of some anti-virus software makers which effectively meant that virus updates could not be downloaded. He said the worm would stop spreading after 21:11:11 on August 20.

Another anti-virus software maker Symantec, which has called the worm W32.Mydoom.Q@mm, said it would infect machines running Windows 2000, Windows 95, Windows 98, Windows Me, Windows NT and Windows XP. Machines running DOS, Linux, any of the Macintosh operating systems, Novell Netware, OS/2 or UNIX would not be affected.

SP2's WINDOWS FIREWALL WON'T BE ENOUGH

In the June 17">http://briansbuzz.com/w/040617/>June 17 issue of Brian's Buzz on Windows, we discussed the promise of Windows XP Service Pack 2 (SP2) and why you need to evaluate this release before Microsoft finalizes the product sometime later this summer. Though it's not billed as such, XP SP2 is the biggest Windows upgrade in years, and is arguably a more disruptive release than 2000's Windows Millennium Edition (Me). That's because Microsoft has infused SP2 with a grab-bag of deep-seated security technologies, many of which will break your favorite applications and Web sites.

Microsoft shipped Release Candidate 2 (RC2) of SP2 to beta testers in June, and expects to offer the "gold" version of the service pack later this year. In this week's issue, we'll discuss the most visible security component in SP2 - and explain why it won't be enough to shield you from electronic attack.

Out with the old, in with the new

Windows XP SP2 includes a new version of XP's little-used Internet Connection Firewall (ICF). This app has been renamed Windows Firewall" in a bid to alert users that this product is a more integrated part of Windows. Unlike its predecessor, Windows Firewall is on by default. The service is designed to protect your system against inbound network traffic even during the period before you logon. This can, in fact, prevent certain types of attacks. Windows Firewall is also far more configurable than ICF. This is due to a more full-featured Control Panel applet that lets you determine the firewall's state. (The firewall may be on, off, or "on with exceptions." The latter state lets you shut down network traffic - even to applications that you normally trust). You can also use the Control Panel to modify your list of trusted programs and services, configure which ports you will allow to be opened, and perform other related tasks.

If you're familiar with third-party firewalls such as the excellent http://www.zonelabs.com>Zone Labs ZoneAlarm products, you've probably experienced the pitfalls of today's firewall solutions: They need to display annoying dialog boxes every time an unfamiliar Internet service attempts to contact a local application on your hard drive, and vice versa. If you're not technically savvy, these dialogs can be hard to decipher. Over time, of course, the number of dialogs you need to deal with drops dramatically. But the sheer number of authorization requests you get after first installing a firewall can be overbearing, regardless of your technical skill level. Windows Firewall also suffers from the same problem, of course, but does offer plain-English explanations of each application request. This relative clarity often makes these dialogs easier to understand than those generated by other firewalls. Sadly, that's where the good news ends.

The bad and the ugly

The basic problem with Windows Firewall is that it's only half a solution. Unlike most third party firewalls - and unlike Microsoft's enterprise-ready solution, Internet Security and Acceleration (ISA) Server - Windows Firewall only protects against inbound network traffic. That means it does nothing to prevent adware or spyware that's gotten into your system from "phoning home" or initiating communications with remote Internet services and Web sites. You might think this isn't a problem. Think again: Even though Windows Firewall can prevent many types of network-based attacks, it can't protect you against that most basic of security problems, the human being sitting in front of the PC.

Because e-mail addresses and Web site addresses can easily be spoofed using readily-available exploits, hackers can fool you nto believing you're interacting with a trusted friend, relative, or company. And if you install a malicious application on your ystem - knowingly or otherwise - Windows Firewall can't prevent that application from sending your private information out onto the Internet. To date, millions of people have succumbed to virus-laden e-mail attachments or "phishing" scams, simply because the e-mail invitations that launched these attacks appeared to come from trusted sources. Third-party firewalls like ZoneAlarm don't suffer from this weakness. They protect both inbound and outbound network traffic. We recently spoke to Zone Labs' Vice President of Marketing, Frederick Felman, who fears that SP2's half-witted firewall will ultimately betray users with its false sense of security. "Where Microsoft is missing out most profoundly with SP2 is with its illusion of security," he said. "It's more damaging than having no security at all, because users take risks that they might not otherwise take. That's where SP2 fails. That's where Microsoft fails."

That's not the only problem with Windows Firewall. While it was engineering SP2, Microsoft changed the way the system nteracts with network resources. Unlike Zone Alarm, Microsoft has engineered Windows Firewall to be the final arbitrator of trust on your system, removing that responsibility from the user. "You think you're protected because it blocks your system from accepting things from the Internet at large," Felman said. "But it [Windows Firewall] trusts the local network by default. If you connect to a semi-private or public network, you're screwed. You don't trust strangers. Why would you trust a network you don't know?"

The problems with Windows Firewall's limitations were recently brought home when one of Paul's systems was infected with a nefarious Trojan horse. The intruder proceeded to install malicious adware applications and an Internet Explorer toolbar on the PC. A month later, the system is still infected, though Microsoft has offered to help solve the problem. But this episode taught us an important lesson. First, once malicious software is installed on a system, SP2 offers no way to detect it, remove it, or even disable it. And second, the inbound-only limitation of Windows Firewall means that such an application is free to do its work uninhibited.

What you can do

Whether you're running a beta copy of SP2 on Windows XP, an older version of XP, or some other relatively recent flavor of Windows, there are some basic steps you can take now. You can proactively defend your system against network-based attacks, and then ensure that your system is protected against any malicious software that does somehow make it through - even if it's due to human

- Get a two-way firewall. So far, we've tested two products that handily beat Windows Firewall. The first is the aforementioned None Labs ZoneAlarm, which is available in free and Pro (\$39.95) versions. Both versions offer twoway firewalling, a suspicious-mail quarantine, outgoing spam-infected mail protection, and other basic security features. The Pro version provides a number of additional improvements. These include pop-up ad blocking, adware cookie detection and deletion, and hacker-reporting capabilities. (Zone Alarm also sells a version that includes antivirus tools and a security suite). Another excellent solution is Tiny Software's Personal Firewall 5.0 (\$49), which is admittedly more technical but also more full-featured than Zone Labs' solution. The http://www.tinysoftware.com Tiny Personal Firewall offers pervasive intrusion detection functionality, spyware and virus blocking, and other advanced features. However, it only runs on Windows 2000, XP, and 2003. Whichever third-party firewall you choose, you should disable Windows Firewall on SP2, or ICF on previous versions of XP. • Get antivirus protection. Microsoft isn't bundling antivirus software in XP SP2, which is a shame. But virtually all of the major players - Panda, Symantec, and McAfee, to name just a few - offer good solutions that include file system and mail protection as
- well as real-time monitoring.
- Run spyware detectors regularly. There are a number of spyware detection/removal solutions available today. Because SP2 won't include such a tool, you'll need to find one you're comfortable with. We recommend two products in this area as well. The first is Lavasoft Ad-Aware (http://www.lavasoftusa.com/), which ships in free, Plus (\$26.95), and Professional (\$39.95), versions. You should definitely grab the free version, but the Plus version, which adds real-time monitoring functionality, is a worthwhile upgrade. Also good is http://www.safer-networking.org SpyBot Search & Destroy, one of the best antispyware applications we've seen. SpyBot S&D is completely free, and it works on every version of Windows from 95 on up. It's possible and even desirable to use the two applications together on the same PC.
- Don't Use IE. Despite some interesting security updates in SP2, Internet Explorer is still the most obvious attack point in your Windows system. Our advice? Don't use IE if you can avoid it. Excellent alternatives like
- http://www.mozilla.org/products/firefox/>Mozilla Firefox and http://www.opera.com>Opera 7.51 aren't just more secure, they also feature better adherence to Web standards and features, like tabbed browsing, that Microsoft doesn't support in IE. Firefox is free, but Opera will set you back \$39 unless you don't mind looking at ads. CNET on July 6 reviewed browsers that outdo IE, including Firefox and Opera as well as the older Mozilla 1.7 and Netscape 7.1. Writer Robert Vamos raved about Firefox 0.9.1, but held back on an outright recommendation because the "gold" release of the product won't officially ship until this September or so. Failing the availability of Firefox 1.0, Vamos wrote: "Mozilla is the best free alternative to Microsoft IE." http://reviews.cnet.com/4520-3513 7-5142616.html>More info
- Evaluate SP2. While we don't recommend that you install the current release of SP2 Release Candidate 2 (RC2) on production machines, you really should take a hard look at this product immediately if you're considering rolling it out on a large scale. You can download the SP2 RC2 release from the Microsoft Web site. We'll be examining other features of SP2 in future issues of the Windows Secrets Newsletter.

- 4. Last but not least, please do not wait till the next fair to fix up any problems you have with the goods. Install the goods after purchasing and ring the dealer immediately if a problem occurs. So the quicker the action the better the resolution that is obtained.
