Our presenter, Basil McMillan, does not claim to be an expert on sound editors and says he is unable to compare the performance or functionality of Audacity with competitive products. He is simply pleased with the results he gets from using Audacity and wants to share his experience by taking us through the steps involved. It is of note, however, that Audacity was voted Audio Authoring Application of the Year in 2007 by the LinuxQuestions.org Members Choice, polling nearly 70% of the votes.

Audacity is free, open source software for recording and editing sounds. It is a cross-platform application with versions available for Mac OS X, Microsoft Windows, GNU/Linux, and other operating systems. Version 1.2.6 is a stable release which is complete and fully documented. If you already have experience with this type of software, the beta version is up to revision 1.3.4 and has many new features but the documentation for it is still being prepared
